
IT IS THE APPLICANTS RESPONSIBILITY TO:

 Be familiar with all aspects of the CAO application system; procedures, dates, fees, rules, etc.

WHAT ARE THE OPTIONS AFTER THE LEAVING CERT?

- Higher Education: (Level 6, 7 or 8 on NFQ)
- Further Education: Post Leaving Certificate Course (Level 5 on NFQ)
- Apprenticeship Carpentry, Electrician, Plumber (Level 6 on NFQ)
- Join the Army, Garda Siochana, Bus Eireann
- Deferring a place
- Gain Employment
- Travel



CAO - GENERAL INFO.

 Three levels of courses applied for on 2 separate lists, through CAO:

Level 6 & 7 Courses

Ordinary Degrees (7) Higher Certificates (6)

Up to 10 Course Choices

Level 8 Courses

Honours Degrees (8)

Up to 10 Course Choices

- The course levels are clearly labelled in the CAO Handbook
- It is possible then to receive an offer from both lists



RESTRICTED COURSES

- Some courses will be marked as restricted (#)
- These courses have the one restricted deadline for application ~ February 1st
- Courses such as music /art / some sports/ medical courses /design/architecture courses are all usually restricted and students may be required to attend interview or audition or to hand in portfolio as an extra entry procedure



IMPORTANT DATES FOR YOUR DIARY

- CAO online application facility opens 5
 November at 12 noon
- Discounted application fee (€30) available up to 20 January 2021
- Normal closing date for applications (€45) is 1st
 February @ 5.15 pm
- Closing date for restricted entry courses e.g. Art courses, Drama courses, some Film courses.... also 1st February 2021
- Change of mind facility becomes available on
 5th May until July 1st @ 5.15pm



POINTS SYSTEM

Course points may change each year depending on supply and demand

POINTS SYSTEM

- Points are calculated from ONE sitting of the Leaving Certificate only.
- Points total is calculated from SIX best subjects
- 25 Bonus points are awarded for Honours Mathematics Grade H6 or higher if among the student's six best subjects
- Entry Requirements can be satisfied over more than one sitting of the Leaving Certificate

A non-linear *Common Points* Scale was introduced to minimise the need for random selection (as a result of the reduction in grade bands).

COLLEGE ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

Your son/daughter needs to satisfy 3 criteria in order to secure his place on a degree course.

- 1. Basic Entry Requirements for each college
- 2. Course Specific entry requirements
- 3. Meet the designated points requirement for that year



ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

THESE MUST BE SATISFIED BEFORE "POINTS" ARE CONSIDERED.

Minimum Entry Requirements E.g. UCD

- Pass 6 subjects
- At least 2 H5 & 4 O6/H7 grades
- Pass in
 - ✓ Irish
 - *Y English*
 - *→ Mathematics**
 - ✓ Another Language*
 - ✓ Science Subject*

Specific Subject Requirements

E.g.

Engineering(UCD)

H4 Maths

Veterinary Medicine(UCD)

H5 Chemistry

Law with French Law(UCD)

H3 French

If all Entry Requirements are met → applicant is deemed 'Qualified' to apply.


POINTS

- If your child meets the eligibility criteria for the course(s) the CAO then calculates their points score.
- The student is placed on a list in order of merit for each course that they are eligible for e.g. if your child has the highest points score he/she goes to the top of the list and the student with the second-highest points score goes second on the list, and so on.
- The college instructs CAO on how many offers to make for each course. If your child was in 20th position for a chosen course, and the institution instructs CAO to offer 25 places, then your child will receive an offer of a place on that course (unless they have received an offer of a course higher up on their preference list).

HOW CAO PLACES ARE ALLOCATED

- Students are offered the highest of their course preferences for which they are eligible.
- It is really important for applicants to realise that they will be offered the single highest preference course on each list that they are deemed eligible for and have the required points.
- Applicants cannot be offered a lower preference course if they receive an offer of a course higher up on their preference

MAKING AN APPLICATION


- Applications can be made online at <u>www.cao.ie</u>
 Always keep proof of sending application:
- Form is very straight forward to fill out.
- **VERY IMPORTANT**
- Students must fill out both course lists in:

Genuine Order of Preference

- They should not put down courses on the basis of their predictions of next years cut off points or their own points scores.
- Why? Look at how places are allocated.



So – what is the best way to fill in the courses?





PLACES ALLOCATION

- The position of a course in a student's preference order does not in any way affect their chance of getting a place on that course.
- The exact same procedure takes place for both lists on the form, hence students may get 2 offers in August one from L6/7 list and one from L8 list may accept only one.
- Regardless of whether or not they accept a course in round 1, they will still be offered a higher preference course in subsequent rounds if they become entitled one.

Higher Education Access Route (HEAR)

- Indicators:
- Income
- Medical/GP visit card
- Means tested social welfare
- Socio-economic group
- DEIS school attendance
- Area profile



HEAR INCOME THRESHOLD

You must have a low family income to be eligible for HEAR. For the purposes of HEAR a low family income is determined by:

- How many children are in your family;
- How many people in your family are in full time education;

Use the information in the table to estimate if your total family income is below the HEAR Income Threshold.

A dependent child is a child under the age of 16 years on 1 October 2016, or over 16 years and attending a full time educational institution or medically certified as permanently unfit for work.

Number of dependent children in your family	Hear Income Limit
Less than 4	€45,790
4-7	€50,325
More than 8	€54,630

Add €4,670 to the total income for every sibling/parent enrolled in a full time college, university or post leaving certificate further education course.



HEAR - HIGHER EDUCATION ACCESS ROUTE

- Aspergers Syndrome/Autism
- ADD/ADHD
- Blind/Vision impaired
- Deaf/Hearing impaired
- DCD- Dyspraxia / Dysgraphia
- Mental Health Conditions
- Neurological Conditions (incl. Brain Injury, Speech and Language Disabilities)
- Significant Ongoing Illness
- Physical Disability
- Specific Learning Difficulty (incl. Dyslexia and Dycalculia)



HEAR AND DARE SCHEMES

- www.accesscollege.ie
- For both HEAR and DARE, students must apply to CAO by 1st February 2021
- All supporting documents must reach CAO by 15th
 March 2021
- For DARE applicants, you must disclose your disability and/or SLD in your CAO application and fully and correctly complete section A of the Supplementary Information Form (part of the CAO application) by 1st March 2021
- For HEAR applicants, complete all elements of the HEAR application form by 1st March 2021
- Guidance Teachers will be assisting students with DARE forms. HEAR forms are more straightforward and will be completed



CAO/HIGHER EDUCATION

Common errors...

- Putting down today's date rather than your Date of Birth!
- Forgetting to tick the box for Leaving Cert 2021
- Not applying for an Irish exemption from NUI if eligible
- Ignoring communications from CAO!!!
- Applying for courses for which you don't have either the basic entry requirements or subject specific requirements!
- Applying for a course in a fee paying college without realising it!
- Not putting your courses down in genuine order of preference!

FURTHER EDUCATION COURSES (FETAC) LEVEL 5

- Full time courses Dundalk (OFI) and Drogheda (DIFE)
- Very practical include work experience
- They have no points requirements and are mainly based on interview
- Wide range of courses
- They can be:
 - A qualification in their own right
 - Can be used as a stepping stone to Higher Education
 - An extra year to mature



POST LEAVING CERTIFICATE COURSES

How to apply

- Students apply online to the college/institute's own website
- Its free to apply and students can put down 3 choices
- Students can apply to PLC courses and to the CAO without compromising either application



APPRENTICESHIPS

- Find an employer who will take on a apprentice
- Register with FAS/SOLAS
- A mixture of

On the job training with the employer and training in a training centre/college

ESB apprenticeships advertised in Feb usually each year

Grants & Scholarships

A study conducted by the Irish League of Credit Unions found that nine out of ten parents support their child through third-level education, contributing an average of €428 a month. When tuition and registration fees are added into the mix, it brings the average cost of going to college in Ireland to almost €10,000 a year. Around 20% of students drop out of college, often due to financial pressure, yet, only one-third of students are eligible for the full **SUSI student maintenance grant**.

- Register with Solas for starting an apprenticeship
